FROM THE PRESIDENT

Good day to all. We are nearing the end of another year, and what a year it has been. Soon I will be attending the AWL State Conference in Sydney (14th November to 17th November) with our vivacious Assistant Secretary Cheryl Wakeham. I will miss my Blue Class that weekend – I hope they miss me too! My role will be to network with other branches and their representatives, and promote the work of our Branch. We are unique, being the only AWL Branch that offers dog training. I have a loud voice and will let everyone know what are fabulous job we do!

My thanks to all of you who have registered this year – that's 104 dogs registered which exceeds our annual training target. This is right up there for me as an achievement, and I am pleased for all of you responsible people, well done. Included in this number are 9 rehomed dogs - nearly ten percent of our annual registration. On behalf of those dogs who have found new homes, Odessa and I thank their handlers. For those who don't know, Odessa is my rehomed darling Great Dane.

My next task in this message is to issue a big "thank you" to all donors and Handlers, past and current. All Handlers have contributed to our fundraising efforts through the payment of registration fees. It has taken us 7 years, but we have finally reached our fundraising goal - which makes the next thing I talk about possible.

The exciting news! Our PAWS/storage shed project is soon to be put online by Eurobodalla Shire Council for public consultation. This follows many meetings with Tina Smith and other Council staff, by Carol Hellmers, Peter Nelipa and myself. Hopefully there will be no public objections and our path to construction will be clear for early 2025. A little bit of history ... our dog training club was started over 20 years ago by Yve Robinson (she passed away November 2023). She and all subsequent branch members have always been keen to find a permanent home for the large amount of training equipment that we own. Unfortunately, due to rules governing various parcels of Crown Land around NATA Oval, we have had to trim down our original vision of PAWS to a large storage shed located within the swimming pool precinct, with secure access from the oval. Whilst this is in some ways disappointing, it is a positive step forward for us. It means that the agility trailer will no longer be stored on private property, most recently in a shed at my place. There will be no need for volunteers to keep gear in private garages or the back of their cars, and it will reduce the amount of gear we cart to NATA every Saturday to zero. We will do our best to advise you when the project comes online for comment. If you can navigate your way through Council's website, we would appreciate a thumbs up submission from you.

Lastly, I encourage you all to attend our Dogs Christmas Party with your dog and family. There is no cost for the morning and a lot of fun to be had, including an opportunity to get into the Christmas spirit with the Best Handler and Dog Fancy Dress. I have mine and Odessa's outfit at the ready! We award trophies to Handlers who have excelled over the year, there are games with prizes, and a lucky gate prize. Bring a chair or rug to sit on, a plate of party food to share for morning tea, and your dog/dogs on lead.

NDTC RULES

- All dogs to be kept on lead in class, unless requested by the Instructor.
- All handlers agree to be responsible for the behavior of their own dog, both ON or OFF lead.
- Children are welcome, but must be under direct parental supervision at all times. Please note children are not covered by AWL insurance.
- Handlers are advised to consult their medical professional regarding tetanus injections.
- NDTC recommends that dog owners hold public liability, in case of accidents or incidents.
- All handlers are asked to wear their name badges to all NDTC classes.
- Handlers are asked to wear appropriate footwear high heels, sandals and thongs are not suitable when training a dog.
- Lessons will start at the advertised times if late, you will miss part of the lesson.
- Be a good NDTC handler read the notice board, listen to announcements and practice between weekly lessons.
- Please remember that all Instructors and other NDTC workers are volunteers. Please be respectful of their generosity. It will help NDTC run more smoothly if you offer assistance when required.
- A first aid kit is available at the ground. See your Instructor if you require assistance.
- Please clean up all dog droppings.
- NDTC conducts a risk assessment of the training area and removes any offending material before classes commence. Nata Oval is a drug, alcohol and smoke free area.

FEES for 2025

NO change from last year.

- Annual registration fee for renewing handlers is payable from 1 February 2025.
- \$40 Adult; \$25 Concession/Junior (over 9 and under 18 years); \$60 Family (any combination)
- Half Year registration fees are reduced for renewing handlers, commencing from 1 August.
- Basic Obedience Program \$50 for 2month program. Booking is essential.

Ground Fee - a fee of \$5.00 per handler is payable each week of attendance.

FROM THE CHIEF INSTRUCTOR

Here we are with the holidays on our doorstep again so I'd like to remind everyone that having a break from dog training doesn't mean having a break from training your dog.

There are many ways to incorporate your training into your day-to-day life. Many of us ask our dogs to sit for their dinner but this is the perfect time to practice a range of commands.

You can ask your dog to "sit" then "drop" and then "sit" again. Ask your dog to "stand" and "stay" and then move their dinner bowl a distance away before giving them a release command like "okay". Other commands that the more advanced handlers could use for giving treats or raw bones could be "come forth", "finish", "finish left" and "leave" - maybe even practice your long sits and drops.

I'd also like to remind everyone to be careful about the festive foods that you may want to share with your dog. We're all aware that chocolate is poisonous to dogs, but there are other dangerous foods to watch out for as well like raisins, currants and sultanas that will be found in Christmas cake and mince pies. Many lollies, such as candy canes, can contain xylitol which is deadly to dogs. Also macadamia nuts, onions, leeks and cooked bones are all harmful to dogs. There are also choking hazards like stone fruit and corn cobs to watch out for. Remember dogs can be opportunistic and will help themselves if given a chance.

That being said, I'd like to wish everyone a relaxing and fun break and don't forget to show off you and your dog's new skills to friends and family that may be visiting.

SUMMERTIME FUN AND SAFETY

Here are a couple of tips to keep your dog healthy, happy and safe through the Summer months:

1. Paralysis ticks

The south coast is a hot spot for the deadly paralysis tick. Your vet can advise on the most appropriate preventative measure for your dog. It is important to keep these medications up to date.

2. Snakes!

Black snakes and tiger snakes are a problem in our neck of the bush. Please take care that your dog does not go adventuring without your supervision. Should your dog get bitten, a fast ride to the Vet for immediate attention is required.

3. Allergies and Hot Spots

Hot conditions, combined with humidity, can cause havoc with the condition of a dog's skin. Any sign of redness, itching, excessive scratching or hair loss should be taken seriously and may require veterinary intervention.

4. Heat Stress

As the weather heats up, monitor your dog for heat stress and avoid heavy exercise in the heat of the day. Provide cool shelter, plenty of water, and check the temperature of the road/pavement you walk on, as the paws can easily be burnt. You may also need to take extra rest stops in the shade of a tree.
